The International Food Protection Issues PDG was established in 2009 with a mission to provide a forum to discuss issues of interest to the international food protection community. We like to believe that this PDG is an exponent of the much more active outreach of IAFP to food safety professionals in the last two decades in order to be truly *Advancing Food Safety Worldwide*.

The PDG has always met the day before all other PDGs, and it has steadily grown from a few dozen attendees to a rather stable gathering of some 60 food safety professionals from around the globe. The membership roster for the PDG tallies up to about 250 members from all continents, with a background in academia, government, industry across a wide range of areas of interest to food safety.

As the active and inspiring discussions during the PDG meeting prove year after year, ensuring food safety takes a joint approach of all stakeholders as well as collaboration among various geographies and countries that are linked-up more globally because of sourcing and food product trade.
