In both cases, the opportunity for the offered travel support was informed on the website, and a special committee selected the awardees. 

During 2024, BRAFP reformulated its communication strategy, with the main objective of attracting the attention of members, companies and the general public to IAFP LATINO 2024. This objective was successfully achieved, with the participation of 650 people, 20 participating companies and a positive evaluation from 95% of participants. The main actions related to communication were:

- **Hiring of Communications Assistant for BRAFP**: Kristy Soraya Coelho was engaged to improve BRAFP Communication. She led the update of BRAFP Website and creation of BRAFP Instagram page.
- **Update of the BRAFP website:** The BRAFP website was completely redesigned, with a more modern visual identity including the new Affiliate nomenclature, formerly called ABRAPA. A section was also created with all information regarding IAFP Latino, including Program, Hotels, Awards, Registration, etc. Also, the BRAFP Website is available in 5 different languages: Portuguese, Spanish, English, Italian and French. Between the 11th and 14th of November 2024, in the city of Santos, SP, IAFP Latino 2024 took place, a satellite event of the annual meeting of the IAFP (International Association for Food Protection), organized by the Brazilian Association for Food Protection (BRAFP). The objective of the event was to disseminate the culture of food safety and quality among professionals and students from academia, government and industry, creating an environment conducive to exchanging professional experiences, presenting scientific data and identifying professional opportunities.

The theme of the year's event was "Challenges for the quality and safety of food produced and sold in Latin America", with lectures discussing topics such as: Public health and resistance to antimicrobials in different animal species, monitoring of pathogens in the food production chain, innovative alternatives for food processing, safety in "new" foods, among others.

The round tables involved discussions such as: risk-based inspection models in Latin America, strengthening food safety in Latin America, food safety in everyday life, trends and perspectives for food services, safety of new foods and ingredients applied to similar plant-based foods, among others.

Financial support was granted for the participation of IAFP Latino 2024 for 12 students and 9 speakers. Four partner institutions and associations (BRAFP, SBM, ICFMH and FEMS) and two companies (MIcrobesNG and LABCAL-UFSC) awarded prizes to works presented during the event. The event had the support and sponsorship of Brazilian Research and Development Agencies (CAPES, CNPq and FAPESP), associations and councils (CRMV-SP, IAFP) and more than 20 companies operating in the food sector. IAFP Latino 2024 was attended by approximately 650 people from 17 countries and different Brazilian regions, who had the opportunity to participate in 5 pre-event courses, 8 lectures in plenary sessions and 18 round tables, with the presentation of more than 100 lectures; Furthermore, 200 scientific works were submitted to IAFP Latino 2024 for

presentation in poster format, with a selection of 10 outstanding works for presentation in an arena organized at the event location. The exhibition fair allowed the dissemination of products and main technological innovations from 18 companies operating in the food sector, stimulating interaction between participants and the formation of cooperation networks. At the end of the event, participants had access to an evaluation form on various aspects of the event organization; **More than 90% of participants responded positively to the questionnaire, indicating the success of the event.**

We believe that the year 2024 represented an important milestone in the history of BRAFP. The main objective of BRAFP is to create an environment for interaction and exchange of technical and scientific information between professionals from Academia, Government and Industry. This is only possible by having a diverse and active member base. Attracting members has always been a challenge and the current Board has been working diligently in this regard. In 2023, BRAFP was made up of 8 members, basically the Board of Directors and Past Presidents. That year, we managed to attract 16 more members, representing an increase of 200%. In 2024, efforts continued to show results, and we went from 24 to 45 members, which meant an increase of approximately 47%.

During 2024, BRAFP reformulated its communication strategy, with the main objective of attracting the attention of members, companies and the general public to IAFP LATINO 2024. This objective was achieved with the participation of 650 people, 18 participating companies and a very positive evaluation from 95% of participants.

The main actions related to communication were:

- Hiring of Communications Assistant for BRAFP: Kristy Soraya Coelho, was engaged to improve BRAFP Communication. She led the update of BRAFP Website and creation of BRAFP Instagram page.
- Update of the BRAFP website: The BRAFP website was completely redesigned, with a more modern visual identity including the new Affiliate nomenclature, formerly called ABRAPA.
- Creation of Instagram BRAFP: in addition to the website, an Instagram profile was created with the aim of reaching a younger audience, who tend to seek information on in social media. During 2024, 229 publications were made, attracting 849 followers.

Another great achievement in the Communication was appointed in the TRILIX Social Media Report from April 2024. The IAFP Facebook post related to the IAFP Latino was the second most popular reaching 1737 people, 188 engagements and 10.1% engagement rate, showcasing how the IAFP Latino attracted the attention from the public:



Between the 11th and 14th of November 2024, in the city of Santos, SP, IAFP Latino 2024 took place, a satellite event of the annual meeting of the IAFP (International Association for Food Protection), organized by the Brazilian Association for Food Protection (BRAFP). The objective of the event was to disseminate the culture of food safety and quality among professionals and students from academia, government and industry, creating an environment conducive to exchanging professional experiences, presenting scientific data and identifying professional opportunities.

The theme of the year's event was "Challenges for the quality and safety of food produced and sold in Latin America", with lectures discussing topics such as: Public health and resistance to antimicrobials in different animal species, monitoring of pathogens in the food production chain, innovative alternatives for food processing, safety in "new" foods, among others.

The round tables involved discussions such as: risk-based inspection models in Latin America, strengthening food safety in Latin America, food safety in everyday life, trends and perspectives for food services, safety of new foods and ingredients applied to similar plant-based foods, among others.

Financial support for the participation of IAFP Latino 2024 was granted for 12 students and 9 speakers. Four partner institutions and associations (BRAFP, SBM, ICFMH and FEMS) and two companies (MIcrobesNG and LABCAL-UFSC) awarded prizes to works presented during the event. The event had the support and sponsorship of three Brazilian Research and Development Agencies (CAPES, CNPq and FAPESP), two associations and councils (CRMV-SP, IAFP) and more than 20 companies operating in the food sector.

IAFP Latino 2024 was attended by approximately 650 people from 17 countries and different Brazilian regions, who had the opportunity to participate in 5 pre-event courses, 8 lectures in plenary sessions and 18 round tables, with the presentation of more than 100 lectures; Furthermore, 200 scientific works were submitted to IAFP Latino 2024 for

presentation in poster format, with a selection of 10 outstanding works for presentation in an arena organized at the event location. The exhibition fair allowed the dissemination of products and main technological innovations from 18 companies operating in the food sector, stimulating interaction between participants and the formation of cooperation networks. At the end of the event, participants had access to an evaluation form on various aspects of the event organization; More than 90% of participants responded positively to the questionnaire, indicating the success of the event.

Another important front of work was establishing partnerships with other Institutions/Associations. Since 2023, BRAFP has been holding events in partnership with other organizations. In 2024, for the IAFP Latino, we had the collaboration of Affiliates from Latin America, with several members participating in the Scientific Committee and speaking during the event.

One highlight from the Affiliates Engagement was the roundtable: Challenges and reflections on promoting a culture of food safety and quality in Latin America with speakers from Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia and Mexico Affiliates, reinforcing the partnership and connection between the Latin American affiliates.

Still about the collaboration with other organizations we signed a partnership with ICFMH to organize the First Food Micro Latino, which will take place in October 2025 in Aracajú, Brazil.

Finally, the BRAFP board are very active members of IAFP: for the last several years, we had members attending to the IAFP Annual Meetings, IAFP Latino Meetings as well as being represented at IAFP Board by our delegate Caio Carvalho currently serving as Affiliate Chairperson and therefor attending to all Board and Affiliate Council Meetings.

Based on the above, we believe that BRAFP qualifies to receive the C. B Shogren Award for having shown significant achievements in the following areas:
